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## Making A Burden Of The Beautiful

Having been at it so long, Satan has developed extraordinary skill in tricking Christians. Though Paul reminds us that we are not ignorant of his designs (2 Corinthians 2:11), it requires constant vigilance on our part because we never know when his next attack is going to come.

Sometimes Satan, using subtlety and a soft touch, worms his way into the minds of saints and wreaks havoc there. He can be stopped, but only if the saint is paying attention. One area in which the adversary shows his mastery at "making crooked the straight paths of the Lord" is in the area of grace. Grace is much misunderstood in the "Christian" world today. However, it is among brethren we will stay in this article.

On occasion I speak to brethren who are falling victim to one of Satan's most devilish doctrines concerning grace: it *must* be earned. Most of the time these brethren are not aware they are falling victim to

this devastating error. Often, they deny believing it, yet their frustrated comments give them away.

Let me give you an example. A brother or sister has progressed in their Bible knowledge, learning, and ability to overcome temptation. They pray daily, assemble faithfully, and engage in worship. Yet self-reflection reminds them that they continue to sin sometimes. They resolve to do better, as every Christian should, yet find their characterized more by frustration life discouragement than joy and peace. Every time they sin they are reminded they do not deserve God's grace. They repent of their sin, yet experience far less joy at the thought of forgiveness than frustration at the knowledge that repentance was needed in the first place. They say grace cannot be earned yet live as if it must. If these brethren are not able to come to a correct understanding of grace they will go through life in a constant state of discouragement and will likely give up eventually.

In Romans 11:5-6 Paul speaks of the remnant. So too at the present time there is a remnant, chosen by grace. But if it is by grace, it is no longer on the basis of works; otherwise grace would no longer be grace. Grace stands not opposite obedience, but meritorious works. Because grace is everything God does for us that we cannot do for ourselves, by definition it cannot be earned or merited.

Unless one genuinely comes to understand and accept this they will find themselves in the same position as the Jews of Romans 9:30-32. What shall we say then? That Gentiles who did not pursue righteousness have attained it, that is, a righteousness that is by faith; but that Israel who pursued a law that would lead to righteousness did not succeed in reaching that law. Why? Because they did not pursue it by faith, but as if it were based on works..."

A distraught brother said, "I just don't feel like I'll ever be good enough." He won't be. None of us ever will. We've sinned, thus "good enough" went out the window long ago. But where sin increased, grace abounded all the more...and...but he gives more grace. (Romans 5:20b...James 4:6a)

It is right to be filled with godly sorrow upon sinning. (2 Corinthians 7:10-11) We *should* be angry at ourselves when we choose sin over God. However, we don't have to earn God's grace. Indeed, we cannot. We faithfully do our best not to sin, repent if we do, praise our God for His forgiveness, resolve to be more like Christ, and go on our way rejoicing at the mercy and love of God. Let us never allow Satan to make a burden of the beautiful.
