"Baptized...In The Name Of Jesus Christ"

For the second time in as many weeks I have received a request to discuss a portion of Peter's instruction to the people in Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost which we can read about in Acts 2:38. You'll recall that in last weeks bulletin we talked about the gift of the Holy Spirit from the last part of the verse. This time we want to discuss what it means to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ.

First we need to mention that there is a textual variation in this place. Manuscript evidence exists that provides this alternate reading: "baptized...on (upon) the name of Jesus Christ." If that is what Peter told the people on Pentecost, he was obviously focusing upon the authority of Christ. In other words, he was telling them to be baptized because Jesus commands it. Such an understanding is abundantly supported by Scripture, particularly as one considers Jesus' own words from Matthew 28:18-20.

It is also possible that the phrase is part of a "baptismal formula," words spoken by the one administering the baptism before the one being baptized is immersed. Each one of us has heard that formula stated before baptisms for as long as we have been in the church.

However, Acts 2:38 is not the only place in the book of Acts where we find people being baptized in the name of Jesus. The questioner also mentioned Acts 10:48 where Peter commands Cornelius and his household to be baptized in the name of our Lord. These instances have naturally led to a question. Why is it that after Jesus Himself said to baptize in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit we find Peter baptizing only in the name of Jesus? Is

there not some inconsistency there? I do not believe there is.

An interesting position that was suggested to me some time ago is that the person receiving the baptism determined the words stated at the time of their baptism. This would mean that the words of Matthew 28 were to be used of the convert from paganism, one who had been without God in the world, knowing not the Father, Son, or Holy Spirit. Converts from Judaism, or those who had been proselytes to Judaism, needed only to make a confession of Jesus Christ before their baptism to prove that they possessed the same faith in Him that they had already possessed in the Father and the Spirit. You must determine for yourself the validity of this position.

Several other views have been posited to deal with the difference in formula between Jesus and Peter. I will mention two of the more credible positions. Some have claimed that to baptize in the name of one of the Godhead is to necessarily involve the other two. Obviously there is truth to that for the entire Godhead is active in baptism. Others have claimed that Luke merely sets forth an abbreviated form of the longer This could also be true for it is formula. common for the inspired writers to quote other portions of the sacred Scripture loosely, making slight variations to the passage they are quoting without in any sense changing the meaning of the original words.

Our baptisms would be useless were it not for Jesus Christ and what He has done. Peter told the people on Pentecost that they would receive the remission of their sins once they had repented and been baptized. That remission, or forgiveness, takes place because it is in baptism that a person comes in contact with Jesus' cleansing blood (Romans 6:3-5). So, when a person is baptized in the name of Jesus Christ they are baptized by His authority. Also, they are indicating that they understand it is only through His sacrificial work that their baptism can have any power whatsoever.
